MINUTES OF THORPE MANDEVILLE'S 2021 ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD BY THE ZOOM ONLINE CONFERENCING FACILITY AT 7.00PM ON MONDAY 26 APRIL 2021

(A notice of the meeting had been displayed on the village notice boards and parish council website from 18 April 2021. Leaflets promoting the meeting had been distributed to houses in the village.)

DRAFT MINUTES SUBJECT TO APPROVAL AT THE 2022 MEETING

2021/1: CHAIRMAN'S OPENING REMARKS

Janet Ormond (JO), Chairman of Thorpe Mandeville Parish Council, welcomed those present explaining that the meeting was not a meeting of the parish council. JO advised that no annual meeting had been held in 2020 because of the coronavirus pandemic but it had since become lawful to hold the meeting by an online conferencing facility.

2021/2: ATTENDANCE AND APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Present: 13 parishioners (including all five parish councillors and the parish clerk) and former South Northants District Councillor Rosie Herring.
Apologies: None

2021/3: MINUTES OF THE 2019 ANNUAL PARISH MEETING: Minutes of the meeting held on 29 April 2019 were approved and the JO was authorised to sign approval.

JO referred to the following matters arising:

2021/3b: TRAFFIC THROUGH THE VILLAGE: This remained a concern. Reference was made to quarry traffic going through the village at the last meeting. All enquiries had indicated that this was legitimate road usage.

2021/3c: COMMUNITY BUS SERVICE: Pleasingly this new service had restarted operating on Mondays and Thursdays.

2021/3d: DEFIBRILLATOR: A defibrillator had been installed at the village hall, kindly donated by the Brackley based charity Do It For Defib. Thanks were expressed to David Wright for maintaining the defibrillator.

2021/4: REPORTS FROM FORMER COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCILLORS

2021/4a: FORMER DISTRICT COUNCILLOR ROSIE HERRING (RH): RH referred to the cessation of Northamptonshire County Council and South Northamptonshire District Council on 31 March 2021 and the formation of a new unitary body West Northamptonshire Council (WNC) on 1 April 2021. Elections for WNC councillors would be held on 6 May 2021. JO referred to a full report from RH being available on the parish council's website.

2021/4b: FORMER COUNTY COUNCILLOR IAN MORRIS: No report had been received.

2021/5: PARISH COUNCIL MATTERS: JO advised the following:

2021/5a: COUNCILLORS: The election for parish councillors on 6 May 2021 had resulted in four nominations, from existing councillors, in respect of the five vacancies. Therefore, the following were re-elected, unopposed: John Clouston, Ian Durham, Emlyn Lilly and Janet Ormond. Tim Moss had not sought re-election after almost ten years on the council. JO expressed thanks for his service on the council.

2021/5b: PRECEPT: The Parish Council precept for 2021/22 had been increased by £200 to £2,600 endeavouring to bring the clerk's salary towards a more realistic basis for the future.

2021/5c: COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY FUND: Since the last meeting, the total of £11,325 had been partly utilised by funding the replacement bench on the green, £2,240, and materials for the replacement notice board on the village hall, £542, leaving £8,543. An additional potential £4,665 would be utilised on village hall floor repairs. Thanks were expressed to Mike Pringle for constructing the new noticeboard and to John Clouston and John Patterson for their work installing the bench and platform.

2021/5d: HS2 ROAD SAFETY FUNDING: At the Parish Council's request, two vehicle activated signs were scheduled to be erected in July, funded by the HS2 road safety fund. Also at the council's request, a new footpath had been constructed on the Banbury Road. In response to a question from Jeremy Greenhalgh, JO explained that the related road closure had been authorised by the county council's highway's department.

2021/5e: HS2 CONSTRUCTION: JO summarised the following current issues:

2021/5e1: An update is expected regarding the Lower Thorpe viaduct design following the public consultation last year.

2021/5e2: JO detailed the background and information received regarding the recently advised long term closure of Banbury Road between Bulls Lane and the Magpie Road junction during the construction period. Further information was awaited from HS2. Various concerns were discussed.

2021/6: POLICE AUTHORITY REPORT

JO summarised a written report provided by the county constabulary which had been available on the parish council website from 18 April. Main concerns in the county included drug use and vehicle thefts.

A new county 'neighbourhood policing initiative' was being introduced whereby there would be more police officers and clarity of police contacts for newly created local policing areas. The towns and parishes had been requested to appoint a Police Liaison Representative as a conduit for information. Maurice Cole, as Parish Clerk, had taken on this role.

The Neighbourhood Watch organisation was now operating in the parish and JO thanked David

Wright for being our representative. The activities of Neighbourhood Watch would not be diminished by the new policing initiative.

2021/7: VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE

John Clouston advised that while the hall had been closed for over a year because of the pandemic a number of steps had been taken to update the hall and reduce future maintenance. Various grants had helped the funding. Work undertaken included reroofing, the installation of a new heating system, refitting the kitchen, resurfacing the yard and currently improvements to the outbuildings and new flooring to one section of the hall.

2021/8: PARISH CHURCH

Churchwarden Maurice Cole reported on the pandemic creating a difficult year both for services and finances. An upbeat aspect was the pleasing reports regarding The Reverend Nicholas Leggett who had taken over the ministry in February 2020. Sadly there was still need for the Chenderit Benefice foodbank which Father Nick had instigated. An architect's report had recently been commissioned to identify any recommended repairs being a Church of England requirement every five years.

2021/9: RABBIT RING

Mags Durham referred to activities of the Rabbit Ring ladies club having been suspended over the last year. Activities would recommence as soon as possible

2021/10: THUMPERS

Tony Limb had advised that the Thumpers mens' club was in a similar position as Rabbit Ring.

2021/11: ANY OTHER BUSINESS: Jeremy Greenhalgh thanked the parish council for its work.

MEETING CLOSED at 8.10pm with the chairman's thanks to those attending.



South Northants Neighbourhood Teams

Annual Report March 2022

The last 12 months have continued to present challenges to police and public alike, with COVID-19 having a huge impact on our lives and how we interact with each other. Thankfully the lockdowns and restrictions seem to be behind us, hopefully for good.

There have been many positives in the past year, and we have seen an increase in the number of officers on the Neighbourhood Policing Teams (NPT). We now have a team of 11 based at Towcester Police Station, consisting of 5 Police Constables, 5 Police Community Support Officers, and 1 Police Sergeant. There is a team of 7 based at Brackley Police Station, consisting of 4 Police Constables, 2 Police Community Support Officers, and 1 Police Sergeant. This uplift in officer numbers means more time spent out and visible in the community, providing reassurance and having a greater ability to address the issues and concerns of the communities we serve.

The Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner (Stephen MOLD) funded two Beat Buses which were successfully launched in late 2021. There is one for each side of the county, and South Northants shares ours with Northampton and Daventry. These specially converted vans are designed to enable us to provide a visible and accessible point of contact for the many villages within South Northants. Whenever possible we will endeavour to have the Beat Bus out at least once a week, and we publish our location ahead of time using social media – this is still a work in progress, and we hope to be publishing this on the Force website consistently. We have also publicised the names and contact details of your local officers, and these are on prominent locations such as parish noticeboards and in village shops and have been circulated to Parish Councils and Neighbourhood Watch.

Over the last year Policing priority surveys have consistently highlighted that road safety; acquisitive crime and drugs use/supply are the most significant areas of concern for most people. As such these are the issues that you can expect the South Northants Neighbourhood Teams (NPTs) to be working on as a priority. There are a number of problem-solving techniques that we utilise to address these issues, including making early interventions in partnership with other agencies such as schools, housing associations and the local authority (the new unitary West Northamptonshire council). A key role that we undertake is safeguarding of vulnerable people in the community, as well as dealing with anti-social behaviour. We also work with our neighbouring forces; Thames Valley and Warwickshire Police; to share information and undertake days of action to detect, disrupt and deter criminality.

With the national lockdowns having ended, and people returning to work, we expected to see a rise in acquisitive crime (theft, burglaries etc.) – we have thankfully not seen a significant rise. Our road network makes South Northants vulnerable to criminals that travel into our area from elsewhere. Whilst some of these will be opportunistic, there have been cases where these criminals have made reconnaissance visits to locations that they later target. Crime levels are consistently low in South Northamptonshire, and it remains one of the safest areas to live in the country. We work hard to

keep it this way, but the police are not able to do this alone – we can only ever be part of the solution. If you notice something that seems unusual, it is far better to tell us and it turns out to be nothing, than to keep it to yourself and we miss an opportunity to disrupt criminals. We need you to tell us what is happening, which is why we want to build strong relationships with the Parish Liaison Representatives for each village.

Neighbourhood Officers will, where they can, monitor local social media sites and often note comments regarding a lack of Police in an area or that a crime or anti-social behaviour would have been prevented if there were more Police about. We have also noted comments such as ‘there’s no Police so why bother reporting it’. All communities have a Neighbourhood Policing Team. Some teams are bigger than others due to area crime trends and demographics but all are available to tackle issues identified as an area of concern by the community. Many issues go unreported and as such Police are not aware. You have an opportunity to shape Policing activity by reporting the issues

that affect you; including those daily ongoing situations that are considered as anti-social behaviour. If you are not telling Police that there is a problem in your part of the community then our resources are likely to be focused elsewhere where an issue has been identified and reported.

Your Neighbourhood Teams are based within the Community at Brackley and Towcester Police Stations and are often the first port of call for an emergency as the closest Police resource. This will always take priority especially where there is a risk to life. The teams also have a wealth of other responsibilities in respect of safeguarding vulnerable people, working with educational establishments, crime investigation and intelligence gathering. The team are dedicated problem solvers and will seek to address long-term issues which range from low level neighbour disputes, persistent anti-social behaviour to larger volume crimes.

Crime and anti-social behaviour will always happen due to constantly changing social and economic factors but we can be better prepared to fight it as a cohesive community. Effective community cohesion may be achieved via; public consultation (Independent Advisory Groups, Policing Priority surveys etc.), the identification of capable guardians and community champions (Emergency Services, Neighbourhood Watch, Street Watch, clubs and organisations) and partnership working with a problem solving approach. You can join and/or support the people that work within your community and help us make the area less attractive to criminals.

We use social media (Twitter: **@SthNorthantsNPT** and Facebook: '**Daventry and South Northants Neighbourhood Policing Team**') and Neighbourhood Alert in order to inform you about crime and incidents relevant to your area and some of the work that the team undertake. There are a lot of aspects of our work that we cannot report back on due to the vulnerabilities of the persons involved, and their right to privacy but this does not mean that we are not doing anything.

We currently have two volunteers that work with the Neighbourhood Teams and the Rural Crime Team. These volunteers undertake visits to farms and other isolated premises within the area with a view to offering crime prevention advice and a means to improve communication regarding criminal behaviour. The Rural Crime Team work on a wide range of issues ranging from interference with badger setts to thefts of caravans and trailers. Neighbourhood Alert is an email messaging system that all Schools, Parish Councils, Neighbourhood Watch and community members can sign up to. In registering your email address you will receive up- to-date information regarding crimes, policing activity and crime prevention advice. Towcester and Brackley currently have Street Watch schemes. Street Watch is the equivalent of a mobile Neighbourhood Watch. It can cover the entire Community and members help tackle issues

Reporting an issue or crime to the Police can be made in a number of ways. This includes ringing 101 or online. Northants Police's new website offers a reporting system for

- A road traffic incident
- Missing person – no immediate harm
- Terrorist activity
- Fingerprints appointments – this could be asked for when travelling abroad
- Hate Crime/ Incident

So that your report can be managed as quickly as possible, it's important to consider the following information and have it ready to provide:

- the date and time the crime happened
- the location, such as address or road name along with the town or village
- a description of any people involved

- the details of any witnesses or suspects
- if you think there's any other evidence such as forensic evidence or mobile phone footage
- if there is clear CCTV footage of the offence being committed
